

Presbyterian Night Shelter at 40

On December 10, 2024, Presbyterian Night Shelter celebrated our 40th birthday with an intimate gathering at True Worth Place. We were honored to have the current pastors of our three founding churches - First Presbyterian Church of Fort Worth, St. Stephen Presbyterian Church, and Ridglea Presbyterian Church - here to tell the story of the Shelter's history and mission. Our CEO, Toby Owen, shared exciting plans for what is next for the agency, including growth of Journey Home Housing and UpSpire over the next ten years.

This month's video is a window into the history of Presbyterian Night Shelter, which was born as a result of the death of an unhoused man during the winter of 1983 - the coldest on record in Fort Worth. One year later, Presbyterian Night Shelter opened in the James E. Guinn Elementary School building on Rosedale Avenue. That first night in 1984, only 4 guests stayed at the simple "sit up" shelter; today, we shelter over 700 people each night!

With the help and hard work of our volunteers, donors, staff, and community partners, we are breaking the cycle of chronic homelessness in Tarrant County. Thank you for helping us serve our community for 40 years and counting!
